This is the first study to provide robust data to inform the use of antibiotic prophylaxis in older men with recurrent urinary tract infections (UTI) and estimate risk of clinical outcomes in an unselected real-world cohort of older adults with recurrent UTI. Antibiotic prophylaxis was associated with a 51% reduction in risk of UTI recurrence in older men, and a 43% reduction in older women.

## Urinary tract infection (recurrent): antimicrobial prescribing

Antibiotic prophylaxis. For people with recurrent urinary tract infection (UTI), preferred treatment options are: Trimethoprim 200 mg single dose when exposed to a trigger, or 100 mg at night. Nitrofurantoin (if eGFR ≥ 45ml/minute) 100 mg single dose when exposed to a trigger, or 50 – 100 mg at night.

## Scenario: Recurrent UTI in men | Management | Urinary ...

Antibiotic prophylaxis for 6 to 12 months significantly reduced the risk of recurrent infection (using microbiological criteria) in non-pregnant women with recurrent UTI (2 or more 'uncomplicated' episodes in the past 12 months) compared with placebo (12.3% versus 65.5%, NNT 2 [range 2 to 3]; high quality evidence).

## Urinary tract infection (recurrent): antimicrobial prescribing

Healthcare professionals do not prescribe antibiotic prophylaxis to adults with long-term indwelling catheters to prevent urinary tract infection unless there is a history of recurrent or severe urinary tract infection.

## Quality statement 6: Antibiotic prophylaxis to prevent ...

Continuous antibiotic prophylaxis is effective in reducing UTI frequency in CISC users with recurrent UTIs, and it is well tolerated in these individuals. However, increased resistance of urinary bacteria is a concern that requires surveillance if prophylaxis is started.

Antibiotic prophylaxis Do not prescribe antibiotic prophylaxis routinely for children following first-time urinary tract infection (UTI). When prescribing antibiotic prophylaxis for children with recurrent UTI, take account of local antimicrobial resistance data. Preferred treatment options are:

For humans. Antibiotic prophylaxis is most commonly used prior to dental surgery or medical surgery, however, may be used in other cases, such as prior to sexual intercourse for patients who suffer from recurrent urinary tract infections. Antibiotic prophylaxis is only recommended to prevent recurrent urinary tract infections in pregnant women in the context of rigorous research. (Context-specific recommendation – research)

## ~~WHO recommendation on antibiotic prophylaxis to prevent ...~~

With Antibiotic Prophylaxis for recurrent Urinary Infections, often a lower dose than treatment dose is used. This is to try and limit resistance, however it will occur at some point. Due to this, this is why the antibiotic is often switched to an alternative every 3-6 months, and continue switching between the two antibiotics this way.

## ~~My daughter is on a prophylactic antibiotic for recurrent~~

In recurrent UTI: Referral should be made if cause is unknown, the woman is catheterized or malignancy suspected. Preventative measures such as behaviour and personal hygiene should be discussed — topical vaginal oestrogen and antibiotic prophylaxis may be appropriate.
