Sirius was the ancient Greek god or goddess of the Dog-Star, the brightest star of

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the constellation Canis Major. The pre-dawn rising of the star in the path of the sun was believed to be the source of the scorching heat and droughts of midsummer.

The brightest star of the night sky, is Sirius, Alpha Canis Majoris (CMa). Due to its intense brightness, Sirius had one of the dominant positions in ancient mythology, legends and traditions.
