Winnicott recognised that "the ordinary devoted mother" was not perfect and would, therefore, inevitably make mistakes in the care of her infant. What she would then do, however, was to make repairs and readjustments in her interaction with the infant.

This helped popularize his teachings, especially after guilt engendered by more Freudian approaches.

[Winnicott's] depiction of the beginning of human life is a kind of wry sublime. The infant's relation to his mother, he says, is one of utter ruthlessness. He uses her in an absolute way, as if this were her destiny. Gradually, by making herself less available to him, the mother "disillusions" the infant.

Winnicott describes the holding environment as a developmental stage in which the child and mother are one entity, as yet undifferentiated in the infant's consciousness. His writings on the subject emphasized empathy, imagination and love between the caregiver and infant.

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
